“ I spent a lot of time with Grandma growing up. Every spring she would take me in that white '65 Ford Galaxie to all the local nurseries to shop for the flowers she would plant -- she always had the best flowers growing around the house. When my brother and I would spend the night, we had to watch Lawrence Welk, but we got popcorn and after that was over we'd get to watch "Dallas" and "Fantasy Island." Grandpa and Grandma drew the line at "Falcon Crest," though. That's when it was time to go to bed.

I still have the red and black plaid chair that she and Grandpa used to read stories to me in when I was little. They were going to throw it out at some point, but I couldn't let them do it.

There always seemed to be a whip-poor-will nested outside in her backyard. . . you could always hear it cooing when I was over there. I hadn't heard one for years, but the day after Grandma died, I was surprised to hear one outside my garage.

I was with Grandma when she passed. She was in tremendous pain for the last few months before she died, and my wife Janet, daughters Heather and Hannah and I had stopped by for a visit, only to find her alert but rapidly and unexpectedly declining. There was time enough for Janet and me to let immediate family know what was happening, and everyone that was close enough to come made it in time to be there in the room with her as she slipped away. Her passing was peaceful, and she knew that we were all there with her.

It was exactly how she would have wanted it.
