Jean Elizabeth Fleck Garner, age 94 formerly of Front St. and S. Sandusky Ave. Upper Sandusky died at Fairhaven Health Care Community on Tues. Apr. 26, 2011 at 9:05 p.m.

She was born Dec. 12, 1916 in Upper Sandusky to the late George M. and Ruby Mae (Smith) Fleck. She married John Nye Garner on Jan. 20, 1940. He preceded her in death on Feb. 7, 2005. She is survived by a son Jon David Garner, Columbus, a daughter Debra Jean Garner Stephan, Upper Sandusky, a grandson Deric (Lana) Marbaugh, Bellevue, and a great granddaughter Julia Jean Marbaugh.

She attended St. Peter's Elementary School and in 1934 Mrs. Garner graduated from Upper Sandusky High School, she attended Miami of Ohio 1934-1935 and Ohio Northern University in 1972.

In listing her memberships Mrs. Garner was a Charter member Alpha Tri Sigma Sorority, which was established in 1938, she was a life member of St. Peter's Catholic Church, life member Rosary Altar Society, life member CLC, life member Usando Literary Club, co-founder of St. Jerome Study Club, Girl Scout leader in the 1960's and Cub Scout leader in the 1950's, she was the first Welcome Wagon Hostess in Upper Sandusky, charter member Star Theatre 1975 (Community Theatre Group), USA Bi-Centennial co-

chairperson/Wyandot County 1976 Bicentennial Park founder, Hands Across America volunteer, "Wyandotte, Wyandotte", Pageant Wyandot Co. Fairgrounds, charter member of Upper's Winter Fantasy of Lights Charity Event Established 1997-1998, Upper Sandusky Citizen of the Year 1984, Committee member Upper Sandusky's Sesqui-centennial 1998 - composed the booklet, committee member of Upper's Family Fest, "Tarhe" re-enactment, at Harrison Smith Park, Aug. 2003 (Author, Producer, Director) and Ohio State Senior Citizen Hall of Fame May 2005.

Mrs. Garner's careers included working in her father's coal office, art teacher at Upper Sandusky High School, wrote for RFD News periodical, activities director for Upper Sandusky Senior Citizens Center for 14 years, wrote "Garner's Gatherings" for the Daily Chief Union, established "Chore Kids" 1990 (community program for kids age 13-15, Trader Gazette Newspaper writer 1985-1995.

Jean treasured time with family and in helping raise her grandson. She and Johnny were life long OSU Buckeye fans, attending many home football games and one Rose Bowl. They enjoyed all things about Lake Erie, having a boat and trailer for 17 years near Marblehead. They loved to travel...Alaska, Canada, German, Mexico, Austria, France and most of the continental USA. Jean and John were known for the "Gingerbread House" on S. Sandusky Ave. Jean's many hobbies included decorating real eggs of all sizes, mainly Goose Eggs even being featured in the Columbus Dispatch, also "scrapbooking" long before the modern versions. She enjoyed many card clubs, starting back in 1934.

My late parents were from large families -- Mom was one of five, Dad was one of four. All nine had spouses or, in one case, a life partner. Last night, the last of those 16 died, a wonderful lady and a favorite aunt, Jean Garner, at 94. It marks the end of a generation, and the passing of a torch to another -- ours.

Jean lived in a small town, Upper Sandusky, Oh., where the Garners were from, and was oh-so-proud of her tiny hometown. She's one of the reasons my memories of summertime visits to the Garners in "Upper" have a Norman Rockwell glow. Jean would be first in line to organize events for centennials or village parades, and wrote a neighborly weekly column in the town newspaper.
